

MEMORANDUM

December 26, 2007

MR. ALVIN V. GRANTS FOR THE ARTS PROGRAM (07085)

COMPLAINT

THE COMPLAINANT ALLEGES THE FOLLOWING FACTS:

Mr. Alvin made a public records request to the Grants for the Arts, a City administered program and request the names of Arts Groups tax supported, Heads of Boards and operations in San Francisco City and County; also the number of black men as managers, artists and curators for years 2005, 2006 and 2007. Mr. Alvin claims that he did not receive the requested documents.

COMPLAINANT FILES COMPLAINT:

On November 1, 2007, Mr. Alvin filed a complaint against the Grants for the Arts Program alleging violations of the Sunshine Ordinance and the Public Records Act.

THE RESPONDENT AGENCY STATES THE FOLLOWING:

On December 11, 2007, Khan Wong, the Grants for the Arts Representative, appeared before the Complaint Committee and acknowledged jurisdiction by the Task Force and stated that he did not receive the original request for records. Following the filing of Mr. Alvin's complaint, the Grants for the Arts Program submitted to the Task Force Office its report for fiscal year 2006-2007.

- Sunshine Ordinance, San Francisco Administrative Code Section 67.1 addresses
 Findings and Purpose.
- Sunshine Ordinance, San Francisco Administrative Code Section 67.21 addresses general requests for public documents.
- 3. Sunshine Ordinance, San Francisco Administrative Code Section 67.24 public information that must be disclosed.
- 4. Sunshine Ordinance, San Francisco Administrative Code Section, 67,26 deals

- with withholding kept to a minimum.
- 5. Sunshine Ordinance, San Francisco Administrative Code Section. 67.27 deals with justification for withholding.
- California Public Records Act, Government Code Section 6253.9 deal with information in an electronic format.
- California Public Records Act, Government Code Section 6253 deals with public records open to inspection; agency duties and time limits.
- 8. California Public Records Act, Government Code Section 6255 deals with justification for withholding of records.
- California Constitution, Article I, Section 3 addresses Assembly, petition, open meetings.

QUESTIONS THAT MIGHT ASSIST IN DETERMINING FACTS;

LEGAL ISSUES/LEGAL DETERMINATIONS;

- Were sections of the Sunshine Ordinance (Section 67.21), Brown Act, Public Records Act, and/or California Constitution Article I, Section three violated?
- Was there an exception to the Sunshine Ordinance, under State, Federal, or case law?

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THE TASK FORCE FINDS THE FOLLOWING FACTS TO BE TRUE:

THE CALIFORNIA CONSTITUTION AS AMENDED BY PROPOSITION 59 IN 2004 PROVIDES FOR OPENNESS IN GOVERNMENT.

Article I Section 3 provides:

- a) The people have the right to instruct their representative, petition government for redress of grievances, and assemble freely ton consult for the common good.
- b)(1) The people have the right of access to information concerning the conduct of the people's business, and therefore, the meetings of public bodies and the writings of public officials and agencies shall be open to public scrutiny.
- 2) A statute, court rule, or other authority, including those in effect on the effective date of this subdivision that limits the right of access shall be adopted with findings demonstrating the interest protect by the limitation and the need for protecting that interest.
- 3) Nothing in this subdivision supersedes or modifies the right of privacy guaranteed by Section 1 or affects the construction of any statute, court rule, or other authority to the extent that it protects that right to privacy, including any statutory procedures governing discovery or disclosure of information concerning the official performance or professional qualifications of a peace officer.
- 4) Nothing in this subdivision supersedes or modifies any provision of this Constitution, including the guarantees that person may not be deprived of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, or denied equal protection of the laws, as provided by Section 7.
- 5) This subdivision does not repeal or nullify, expressly or by implication, any constitutional or statutory exception to the right of access to public records or meetings or public bodies that is in effect on the effective date of this subdivision, including, but not limited to, any statute protecting the confidentiality of law enforcement and prosecution records.
- 6) Nothing in this subdivision repeals, nullifies, supersedes, or modifies protections for the confidentiality of proceedings and records of the Legislature, the Members of the Legislature, and its employees, committee, and caucuses provided by Section 7 of Article IV, state law, or legislative rules adopted in furtherance of those provisions: nor does it affect the scope of permitted discovery in judicial or administrative proceedings regarding deliberations of the Legislature, the Members of the Legislature, and its employees, committees, and caucuses.

ATTACHED STATUTORY SECTIONS FROM CHAPTER 67 OF THE SAN FRANCISCO ADMINISTRATIVE CODE (THE SUNSHINE ORDINANCE) UNLESS OTHERWISE SPECIFIED

Section 67.1 addresses Findings and Purpose

The Board of Supervisors and the People of the City and County of San Francisco find and declare:

- (a) Government's duty is to serve the public, reaching its decisions in full view of the public.
- (b) Elected officials, commissions, boards, councils and other agencies of the City and County exist to conduct the people's business. The people do not cede to these entities the right to decide what the people should know about the operations of local government.
- (c) Although California has a long tradition of laws designed to protect the public's access to the workings of government, every generation of governmental leaders includes officials who feel more comfortable conducting public business away from the scrutiny of those who elect and employ them. New approaches to government constantly offer public officials additional ways to hide the making of public policy from the public. As government evolves, so must the laws designed to ensure that the process remains visible.
- (d) The right of the people to know what their government and those acting on behalf of their government are doing is fundamental to democracy, and with very few exceptions, that right supersedes any other policy interest government officials may use to prevent public access to information. Only in rare and unusual circumstances does the public benefit from allowing the business of government to be conducted in secret, and those circumstances should be carefully and narrowly defined to prevent public officials from abusing their authority.
- (e) Public officials who attempt to conduct the public's business in secret should be held accountable for their actions. Only a strong Open Government and Sunshine Ordinance, enforced by a strong Sunshine Ordinance Task Force can protect the public's interest in open government.
- (f) The people of San Francisco enact these amendments to assure that the people of the City remain in control of the government they have created.
- (g) Private entities and individuals and employees and officials of the City and County of San Francisco have rights to privacy that must be respected. However, when a person or entity is before a policy body or passive meeting body, that person, and the public, has the right to an open and public process.

Section 67.21 addresses general requests for public documents.

This section provides:

- (a) Every person having custody of any public record or public information, as defined herein, ... shall, at normal times and during normal and reasonable hours of operation, without unreasonable delay, and without requiring an appointment, permit the public record, or any segregable portion of a record, to be inspected and examined by any person and shall furnish one copy thereof upon payment of a reasonable copying charge, not to exceed the lesser of the actual cost or ten cents per page.
- (b) A custodian of a public record shall as soon as possible and within **ten days** (emphasis added) following receipt of a request for inspection or copy of a public record, comply with such request. Such request may be delivered to the office of the custodian by the requester orally or in writing by fax, postal delivery, or e-mail. If the custodian believes the record or information requested is not a public record or is exempt, the custodian shall justify withholding any record by demonstrating, in writing as soon as possible and within ten days following receipt of a request, that the record in question is exempt under express provisions of this ordinance.

Section 67.25 provides:

- a.) Notwithstanding the 10-day period for response to a request permitted in Government Code Section 6256 and in this Article, a written request for information described in any category of non-exempt public information shall be satisfied no later than the close of business on the day following the day of the request. This deadline shall apply only if the words "Immediate Disclosure Request" are placed across the top of the request and on the envelope, subject line, or cover sheet in which the request is transmitted. Maximum deadlines provided in this article are appropriate for more extensive or demanding requests, but shall not be used to delay fulfilling a simple, routine or otherwise readily answerable request.
- b.) If the voluminous nature of the information requested, its location in a remote storage facility or the need to consult with another interested department warrants an extension of 10 days as provided in Government Code Section 6456.1, the requestor shall be notified as required by the close of business on the business day following the request.
- c.) The person seeking the information need not state his or her reason for making the request or the use to which the information will be put, and requesters shall not be routinely asked to make such a disclosure. Where a record being requested contains information most of which is exempt from

disclosure under the California Public Records Act and this article, however, the City Attorney or custodian of the record may inform the requester of the nature and extent of the non-exempt information and inquire as to the requester's purpose for seeking it, in order to suggest alternative sources for the information which may involve less redaction or to otherwise prepare a response to the request

Section 67.26 provides:

No record shall be withheld from disclosure in its entirety unless all information contained in it is exempt from disclosure under express provisions of the California Public Records Act or of some other statute. Information that is exempt from disclosure shall be masked, deleted or otherwise segregated in order that the nonexempt portion of a requested record may be released, and keyed by footnote or other clear reference to the appropriate justification for withholding required by section 67.27 of this article. This work shall be done personally by the attorney or other staff member conducting the exemption review. The work of responding to a public-records request and preparing documents for disclosure shall be considered part of the regular work duties of any city employee, and no fee shall be charged to the requester to cover the personnel costs of responding to a records request.

Section 67.27 provides:

Any withholding of information shall be justified in writing, as follows:

- a.) A withholding under a specific permissive exemption in the California Public Records Act, or elsewhere, which permissive exemption is not forbidden to be asserted by this ordinance, shall cite that authority.
- b.) A withholding on the basis that disclosure is prohibited by law shall cite the specific statutory authority in the Public Records Act of elsewhere.
- c.) A withholding on the basis that disclosure would incur civil or criminal liability shall cite any specific statutory or case law, or any other public agency's litigation experience, supporting that position.
- d.) When a record being requested contains information, most of which is exempt from disclosure under the California Public Records Act and this Article, the custodian shall inform the requester of the nature and extent of the nonexempt information and suggest alternative sources for the information requested, if available.

Dear Chair Cauthen and Members of the Complaint Committee:

This letter addresses the issue of whether the Sunshine Ordinance Task Force ("Task Force") has jurisdiction over the complaint of Mr. Alvin against the San Francisco Grants for the Arts.

BACKGROUND

Mr. Alvin made a public records request to the Grants for the Arts, a City administered program and request the names of Arts Groups tax supported, Heads of Boards and operations in San Francisco City and County; also the number of black men as managers, artists and curators for years 2005, 2006 and 2007. Mr. Alvin claims that he did not receive the requested documents.

COMPLAINT

On November 1, 2007, Mr. Alvin filed a complaint against the Grants for the Arts Program alleging violations of the Sunshine Ordinance and the Public Records Act.

RESPONDENT'S RESPONSE

Following the filing of Mr. Alvin's complaint, the Grants for the Arts Program submitted to the Task Force Office its report for fiscal year 2006-2007.

SHORT ANSWER

Based on Complainant's allegation and the applicable sections of the Sunshine Ordinance and the California Public Records Act, which are cited below, the Sunshine Ordinance Task Force does have jurisdiction over the allegation. The allegations are covered under Section 67.21 of the Ordinance.

DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Article I Section 3 of the California Constitution as amended by Proposition 59 in 2004, the State Public Records Act, the State Brown Act, and the Sunshine Ordinance as amended by

Proposition G in 1999 generally covers the area of Public Records and Public Meeting laws that the Sunshine Ordinance Task Force uses in its work.

The Sunshine Ordinance is located in the San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 67. All statutory references, unless stated otherwise, are to the Administrative Code. Section 67.21 generally covers requests for documents and Section 67.25 covers Immediate Disclosure Requests. CPRA Section 6253 generally covers Public Records Requests.

In this case, Mr. Alvin claims that the Grants for the Arts Program failed to comply with his public records request. The Task Force has jurisdiction to hear this case and will have to determine whether the Grants for the Arts Program violated the Ordinance and/or the Public Records Act.

We received Mr. Alvin's requests for information over the phone in December 2006 and in early 2007. There were two phone conversations with two different staff members. These were oral requests for information which made no reference to the Sunshine Ordinance. No request in writing was ever received from the complainant.

Following is each point of the complaint and our response:

1) "Would not give me names of Arts groups -tax supported - heads of boards and operations in San Francisco City and County."

Response: A copy of our Annual Report which includes the names of all organizations funded by this department, along with each organization's contact information, was sent. This information is also posted on our website, to which Mr. Alvin was referred.

During the conversation, the complainant did not ask for the names of "the heads of boards and operations". We have this information and certainly would have provided it had it been requested, and could do so now at the complainant's request.

In the phone conversations, it was also explained that while we could provide the names of those groups funded by this department, there are other arts organizations that we do not fund that could well receive "tax support" from other sources, but that we only have information on Grants for the Arts recipients.

2) "Also, number of black men as managers, artists and curators for years 2005, 2006 and 2007."

Response: We explained during the phone conversation that this is not information that we collect and we do not have any statistics responsive to this request.

Grants for the Arts Progress Report by Kary Schulman, Director

With the City's progress toward restored fiscal nealth, Grants for the Arts, along with all of San Francisco's arts agencies (the San Francisco Arts Commission, the War Memorial Performing Arts Complex, the Fine Arts and Asian Art Museums) received much needed and long-delayed funding ncreases. Although these increases did not restore budgets to historic highs, they went far toward restablishing the City's commitment to the arts.

The approximately \$676,500 in increased funding to Grants for the Arts was distributed as follows:

\$568,700 in increased funding to support organizations' increasing budgets

\$107,800 in funding for 13 new organizations, pringing the the total number of groups funded to 222.

"th these increases to ongoing recipients and firste funding for newly qualifying organizations, we renew our emphasis on the primary goal of providing progressive, meaningful support for San Francisco's cultural groups at all budget levels. (This included partial funding restoration for the six largest funded programizations, which saw their Grants for the Arts allocations decrease by more than 30% between 2001 and 2005.)

The San Francisco Arts Task Force, which met for over a year, issued a report in March 2006 which dentified several areas of productive collaboration between Grants for the Arts and the San Francisco Arts Commission. Both agencies have embraced these recommendations that will be addressed in the coming years, including:

- Aligning application documents for both agencies
- Creating a joint database
- Developing a comprehensive Neighborhood Arts strategy
- Strengthening technical assistance to arts organizations

The NonProfit Performing Arts Loan Program (NPALP), a City program which has lent over \$2M to nearly a dozen organizations for capital acquisition

and improvements in its 22-year history, has been transferred from the Mayor's Office of Housing to Grants for the Arts. We have submitted revised

Rules and Regulations to the Board of Supervisors for approval and hope to make loans available to qualifying organizations beginning in 2007/08.

Last year in our Annual report introduction, San Francisco Foundation Arts Program Officer and newly appointed Grants for the Arts Advisory Committee member John Killacky détailed the extraordinary artistic, programmatic and capital advances made by San Francisco's arts community in 2005. This year, increased funding from the City's Hotel Tax Fund has assisted the consolidation of these advances as well as laying the groundwork, in John's words, "to guarantee a fertile environment for the next generations of artists to live, work and create here in the Bay Area."

History of Grants for the Arts

Grants for the Arts/San Francisco
Hotel Tax Fund (GFTA) was the first
agency of its kind in the nation when
it was founded in 1961, through a
combination of City and state
legislation. Highly respected and
widely emulated, GFTA has evolved
into a national and international
model for municipal funding of the
arts and has been at the center of the
City's cultural identity, improving its
quality of life, strengthening its
economy and enhancing its
reputation.

Since its creation, GFTA has



distributed more than \$250 million to hundreds of nonprofit cultural organizations in San Francisco. This economic investment in the activities of diverse arts and promotional groups enhances the City's attractiveness to visitors and provides employment and enrichment to the City's residents. Grants for the Arts/San Francisco Hotel Tax Fund revenue derives from a portion of the 14% room tax levied on local hotel and motel bills.

GFTA's policy of contributing to arts organizations' general operating

expenses addresses its goal to be a stable, dependable base of support for the broadest spectrum of arts organizations that continue to meet the funding criteria.


The goal of the Fund is to contribute meaningfully to the presentation and enhancement of existing art forms while assuring the ability of others to experiment, to dare and to find new and yet untested ways of adding to our cultural lives. We look forward to a future full of challenges – and thus, by definition, full of opportunities.

Annual Grants to San Francisco Arts Organizations

The foremost goal of Grants for the Arts is to provide a stable, dependable base of support for the City's arts and cultural organizations that meet its funding criteria. In fulfilling its mission of "promoting the City through support of the arts," Grants for the Arts annually funds non-profit arts and cultural organizations that help promote San Francisco as a destination for regional, national and international visitors. Grants for the Arts is committed to supporting the broadest spectrum of the San Francisco arts community.

Reliable, ongoing financial support is one of the cornerstones of an arts organization's existence. Grants for the Arts' relationship with the City's non-profit groups is quite unique in terms of national municipal support of the arts. This is because funding is not linked to specific projects or productions. Instead, the annual grant program is designed to provide a consistent source of funds for general operating expenses.

Grants for the Arts funding levels are determined on a progressive basis with smaller budget organizations receiving a larger percentage of their budgets and larger groups a smaller percentage from the Fund. San Francisco's largest cultural institutions are given important sustaining funds in recognition of their world-renowned artistic contributions and economic importance to the City. The majority of the funds (nearly 70%) goes to the small and midsize organizations of all disciplines and cultures.

Grants for the Arts Programs -continued

Arts and Tourism—A Partnership with the San Francisco Convention and Visitors Bureau

Grants for the Arts established the first Arts and Tourism Program in the United States in 1989 with the goal of promoting San Francisco as a cultural destination to travel industry professionals, including tour wholesalers, travel agents, convention planners and others. In 1991 the San Francisco Convention and Visitors Bureau became the first agency to incorporate an Arts and Tourism office as a crucial part of its marketing to visitors and business travelers. Since then, the Arts and Tourism program has worked to increase visitor attendance at arts events. A recent notable project is the production of an in-flight promotional video for United Airlines, "San Francisco is all about the Arts," which will play on westbound domestic and transatlantic flights, reaching more than a million passengers monthly. Another is the 2002-2003 VIP Cultural Passport, a special promotional package distributed to travel trade professionals, meeting planners and media professionals who visit San Francisco and influence destination decisions. Helping visitors experience and appreciate San Francisco's famous diversity is "Diverse City Destinations" (www.destinationsf.com), a series of ten self-guided tour itineraries that immerse the visitor in the best of San Francisco's culture, ethnic heritage and arts.

San Francisco Arts Monthly

A project of Grants for the Arts, San Francisco Arts Monthly is an outreach publication to San Francisco visitors. It is provided free to hotel guests and concierges and is distributed in theater lobbies, Moscone Center, restaurants and cafes, bookstores and other targeted locations in San Francisco.

According to a study recently completed by Dance USA, commissioned by the Bay Area foundation community:

"Arts Monthly has been a huge success in building audiences. This publication, started by Grants for the Arts as a tool for concierges, lists arts events for each month. When editors arranged to insert the publication in the New York Times in the first Sunday of each month artists started advertising in it, the perception was that the artists were in the New York Times. The cost of producing it is relatively low. And it raised the visibility and credibility of dance."

How do artists and audiences take advantage of new Web technology and the Internet to promote the arts in San Francisco? This has been the topic of discussion by Grants for the Arts and its constituent groups for a number of years. As part of GFTA's mandate, linking its activities to attract visitors to San Francisco, GFTA has led the way in creating a searchable clutter-free database of San Francisco arts offerings on the web with the 2001 launch of SFArts.org. This online calendar is quickly becoming a widespread and indispensable tool for anyone, anywhere who is interested in the arts in San Francisco.



Organizations that receive GFTA support are listed on the site. Each group has been invited to create a reciprocal link to SFArts.org so that visitors can go directly to an

arts group's Web site and get more details about program offerings.

Thousands of promotional cards that feature the Web address have been distributed through the San Francisco Convention and Visitors Bureau, on-site at various locations in San Francisco as well as online to individuals and groups interested in visiting the City. SFArts.org bookmarks have also been placed at the California State Fair, in theater lobbies, bookshops and cafes or stuffed into programs and newsletters. Radio and print ads, BART signs and more have promoted the site, which is now ranked No. 1 on most of the country's top search engines.
