2 **Resolution recognizing and commending the work and impact of the Coleman**
3 **Advocates.**

4 WHEREAS, Coleman Advocates is a multi-racial, intergenerational youth-
5 development, leadership, and racial-justice advocacy community organization in District
6 11 and a long-time partner of the Youth Commission; and

7 WHEREAS, Coleman Advocates actively advocates for Black and Brown
8 people's rights such as leading rallies demanding SFUSD to pause school closures
9 affecting neighborhood kids, youth-led campaigns to close juvenile hall, and community
10 events for community feedback; and

11 WHEREAS, Coleman Advocates has been a champion in civic engagement.
12 They have been a valuable partner in supporting the Youth Commission and Vote 16—
13 the ballot initiative campaign to lower San Francisco's voting age to 16 years old in
14 2016 and 2020. Their efforts have built momentum to increase youth civic engagement
15 for disproportionately represented Black and Brown communities¹²; and

16 WHEREAS, Coleman Advocates has created an environment where youth are
17 challenged and encouraged to become leaders in their community, through support
18 from the Coleman Advocates YMAC and SMAC; and

19 WHEREAS, Coleman Advocates has created a safe space for youth where their
20 diverse cultures and identities are celebrated; and

WHEREAS, Coleman Advocates are consistently advocating for youth mental health resources, ensuring that they are readily accessible to Black and Brown communities; and

WHEREAS, In 2014, Coleman Advocates led Prop C which provided 60 million dollars in public school fund, now referred to as the PEEF Fund. The passage of Prop C gave youth access to quality education and a supportive learning environment, significantly improving public education in San Francisco³; and

WHEREAS, Coleman Advocates has created spaces like CMAC (Citywide Parent Advisory Council) and PMAC (Parent Mentorship and Advocacy Council), ensuring that parents have the knowledge to be active roles in shaping youth education and school systems; and

WHEREAS, Coleman Advocates advocated for the Children’s Fund in 1991 to sustain a long term funding towards youth related programs/services, this gives youth access to vital services while also a voice in shaping city priorities; and

WHEREAS, Coleman Advocates has been a valuable partner to the Youth Commission in leading Vote 16 – the campaign to lower San Francisco’s voting age to 16 years old in 2016 and 2020, building momentum to increase youth civic engagement for disproportionately represented Black and Brown communities; and therefore be it

**Resolution Recognizing and Commending Linda Ye, Former Youth Commissioner
and Sugary Drinks Distributor Tax Advisory Committee Youth Member (Seat 6) For
Her Work and Dedication Towards Youth Public Health in San Francisco.**

WHEREAS, The beverage industry has historically targeted low-income
communities of color through extensive advertising and low prices that target children and
families, resulting in disproportionately higher purchasing and consumption rates in these
populations¹; and

WHEREAS, This targeted marketing has contributed to elevated rates of chronic
diseases in these communities, including heart disease, type 2 diabetes, and tooth
decay²; and

WHEREAS, According to the 2024 Sugary Drinks Distributor Tax (SDDT) Data
Brief, food insecurity in San Francisco is 67%, the highest it has been since the California
Health Interview Survey began measuring food insecurity in 2001³; and

WHEREAS, In November 2016, San Francisco voters passed the Sugary Drinks
Distributor Tax (SDDT), otherwise known as the San Francisco Soda Tax, which
established a penny-per-ounce tax on sugary drinks in San Francisco⁴; and

WHEREAS, The San Francisco soda tax uplifts public health through funding
nutritional security (food security, food access, health retail, urban agriculture, and

1 nutrition education), physical activity, water access in public venues and schools, oral
2 health, workforce development for healthy eating/active living organizations, and
3 community building programs; and

4 WHEREAS, The San Francisco Soda Tax also provides funding to the San
5 Francisco Department of Health, San Francisco Human Services Agency, San Francisco
6 Unified School District, and the San Francisco Office of Economic & Workforce
7 Development in the form of grants and other initiatives⁵; and

8 WHEREAS, The Sugary Drinks Distributor Tax Advisory Committee makes
9 recommendations on budget allocations of the Sugary Drinks Distributor Tax and its
10 impact, along with creating strategies to address public health issues in low-income
11 communities of color⁶; and

12 WHEREAS, Linda Ye served as the District 4 Youth Commissioner from
13 September 2023 to August 2024 and as the chair of the Transformative Justice
14 Committee, where she advocated for issues ranging from improving language access to
15 food insecurity; and

16 WHEREAS, Linda Ye served as the youth member (Seat 6) on the Sugar Drinks
17 Distributor Tax Advisory Committee from April 2023 to March 2025; and

18 WHEREAS, Throughout her tenure on the Committee, she advised the Board of
19 Supervisors and Mayor on optimal allocation for the Sugary Drinks Distributor Tax Fund
20 and developed initiatives to address public health challenges among low-income and
21 BIPOC communities, contributing a unique youth perspective through her role; and

1 WHEREAS, She also served as the Chair of the Community Input Subcommittee,
2 where she increased accessibility and transparency of the actions of the Advisory
3 Committee, led cross-departmental meetings, and engaged with community
4 organizations to gather feedback and ensure stakeholder voices were reflected in the
5 Sugar Drinks Distributor Tax Advisory Committee's recommendations⁷; and therefore be
6 it

7 RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission hereby commends Linda
8 Ye for her work on the Sugary Drinks Distributor Tax Advisory Committee and recognizes
9 the positive impact her legislative and budgetary advocacy has made on young people
10 across the City and County of San Francisco; and therefore be it

11 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Chair of the Youth Commission is authorized to
12 issue a Certificate of Honor to Linda Ye for her dedication to advancing public health for
13 those from low-income and BIPOC backgrounds.
