- 7 reaching 9% of its state mandate to permit more than 82,000 units of new housing by
- 8 2031, as of December 2024<sup>1</sup>; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Between 2012 and 2016, the San Francisco metro area added
- 10 373,000 new jobs while only issuing permits for 58,000 new housing units<sup>2</sup>; and
- 11 WHEREAS, San Francisco's housing shortage has led to a cost of living crisis,
- 12 with housing costs in the San Francisco metro area being 113% higher than the national
- 13 average and rent for a one-bedroom apartment being the third highest out of any city in
- 14 the United States, as of 2022<sup>3</sup>; and
- 15 WHEREAS, The high cost of living in San Francisco has adversely affected the
- 16 city's youth by pushing many families out of the city, where their communities, schools,
- 17 jobs, and friends are<sup>4</sup>; and

2	results in suburban sprawl that reduces transit access and forces people into longer
3	commutes by car, which hurts the environment by increasing carbon emissions <sup>5</sup> ; and
4	WHEREAS, Senate Bill 79 alleviates the housing shortage by legalizing more
5	housing within one-half mile of major transit stations within San Francisco and across
6	the entire state of California; and
7	WHEREAS, Senate Bill 79 improves access to public transit in San Francisco

9	WHEREAS, Senate Bill 79 helps fund public transit agencies by allowing for
10	more housing development on agency-owned land near major transit stations; and
