1 [Funding Support for Early Childcare]

## 2 Motion urging the Mayor and Board of Supervisors to support funding for the

3 Department of Early Childhood.

WHEREAS, In 2022, former Mayor London Breed and Supervisor Melgar
initiated the Department of Early Childhood (DEC) which included investments in
affordable childcare, literacy services, pay raises for SFUSD educators, child wellness
programs, etc.<sup>1</sup>; and

- 8 WHEREAS, Since the creation of DEC, San Francisco has been an example for
- 9 the importance of supporting early childcare; and
- 10 WHEREAS, Issues facing children under the age of 6 are oftentimes ignored
- 11 during policy discussions; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Research done by the National Library of Medicine indicates that the
- 13 ages of 0-5 are critical to a child's long-term social, cognitive, emotional, and physical
- 14 development. Additionally, children facing food insecurity and poverty have an increased
- 15 likelihood of developing health issues later on in their adulthood<sup>2</sup>; and
- 16 WHEREAS, In fiscal year 2023-2024, DEC allocated \$123.2M for early learning
- 17 tuition, \$44.3M for workforce compensation, \$22.7M for Family Resource Centers, and
- 18 \$16.9M for child care facilities<sup>3</sup>; and

1	WHEREAS, Early childcare educators in San Francisco play a vital role in
2	supporting the social, emotional, and cognitive development of children to help foster a
3	healthy generation of young people; and
4	WHEREAS, According to data from DEC, San Francisco saw an increase of 10%
5	in kindergarten readiness since 2021, with 7,882 children currently enrolled in free
6	childcare <sup>4</sup> ; and
7	WHEREAS, Early Learning for All provides affordable and high quality child care
8	and education, in which ⅔'s of San Francisco families are eligible for a free or
9	subsidized program <sup>5</sup> ; and
10	WHEREAS, Access to affordable and high quality early childcare is essential to
11	support working families and ensure that all children are able to receive support in the
12	most developmentally critical period of time in their lives; and therefore be it
13	MOVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission urges the Mayor and Board
14	of Supervisors to continue to fund the Department of Early Childhood and protect
15	subsidies for child care and early education programs from being cut; and be it
16	FURTHER MOVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission recognizes the
17	importance of funding programs such as Early Learning for All and affordable childcare,
18	as well as the importance and tremendous impact of early childcare educators in our
19	city; and be it
20	FURTHER MOVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission staff shall
21	transmit a copy of this motion to the Mayor and Office of Supervisor Myrna Melgar.
