Compensation]

**Motion to urge the San Francisco Board of Supervisors and Mayor to support  
Assembly Bill 1155: Law schools: externships: compensation**

WHEREAS, Externships for law students are “work performed by a law student  
at a state agency, nongovernmental organization, nonprofit organization, or for-profit  
firm, as part of their legal education, that is completed within the law school’s course  
guidelines to receive law school credit”<sup>1</sup>; and

WHEREAS, Externships provide opportunities for students to apply knowledge  
learned in the classroom in professional environments and explore career paths before  
making long-term commitments; and

WHEREAS, California-accredited law schools require law students to complete a  
minimum of six credit hours of experiential learning, which externships can fulfill; and

WHEREAS, The current lack of compensation creates barriers for low-income  
law students to pursue externships, allowing for compensation will increase accessibility  
to these opportunities; and

WHEREAS, Every year, several hundred students pursue law school in San  
Francisco; and

WHEREAS, The cost of completing a J.D. program is nearly \$175,000 at  
American Bar Association-approved law schools, and for University of California-  
accredited law schools, the cost is over \$75,000; and

1 WHEREAS, One-third of law students are first-generation, and 35% of first-  
2 generation law students are expected to accumulate more than \$120,000 in debt to  
3 obtain a law degree; and

4 WHEREAS, In August 2024, the ABA House of Delegates adopted Resolution  
5 514, which encouraged the compensation of law school externs; and

6 WHEREAS, The ABA Young Lawyers Division's 2021 student loan debt survey  
7 revealed that over half of respondents accumulated more than \$150,000 in debt after  
8 graduating law school, and 40% of student loan debt increased<sup>2</sup>; and

9 WHEREAS, The accumulation of debt has impeded law students from pursuing  
10 homeownership, marriage, etc.; and

11 WHEREAS, Law students carrying debt reported higher levels of stress, anxiety,  
12 and depression<sup>3</sup>; and

13 WHEREAS, AB 1155 requires externship sites to compensate law students  
14 enrolled in American Bar Association-accredited or University of California-accredited  
15 law schools or independent institutions of higher education; and

16 WHEREAS, Given the significant debt burden and increasing demand for legal  
17 professionals, there is a clear need for this bill to support the next generation of lawyers;  
18 and therefore be it

19 MOVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission hereby urges the Mayor  
20 and Board of Supervisors to advise the State Legislature, especially San Francisco's

2 Stefani, and Assemblymember Matt Haney, to support AB 1155; and therefore be it

3       FURTHER MOVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission urges the Mayor  
4 and Board of Supervisors to recognize the contributions of law students in strengthening  
5 justice, representation, and equity in the legal system, and to acknowledge both the  
6 rising costs of legal education and their pivotal role in inspiring young people to pursue  
7 legal professions.

Dear Assemblymember Fong,

We are writing in support of your bill, AB 1155.

The San Francisco Youth Commission comprises 17 youth from San Francisco, aged 12 to 23. Created by the voters under a 1995 amendment to the City Charter, the commission is responsible for advising the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor on policies and laws related to young people. The Youth Commission is also charged with providing comments and recommendations on all proposed laws that would primarily affect youth before the Board of Supervisors takes final action.

The San Francisco Youth Commission urges AB 1155 to be passed as it requires externship sites to compensate law students enrolled in American Bar Association-accredited or University of California-accredited law schools or independent institutions of higher education.
