- 4 WHEREAS, Sexual violence remains a pervasive and urgent public health issue
- 5 affecting individuals of all ages, genders, and backgrounds across the United States;
- 6 and
- 7 WHEREAS, According to The facts behind the #metoo movement: A national
- 8 study on sexual harassment and assault, 81% of women and 43% of men reported
- 9 experiencing some form of sexual harassment and/or assault in their lifetime; and
- 10 WHEREAS, According to Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs,
- Bureau of Justice Statistics, Sex Offenses and Offenders youth between the ages of 12
- thru 34 are the highest risk years for rape and sexual assault; and
- WHEREAS, The United States Department of Health and Human Services,
- 14 Administration for Children and Families, Administration on Children, Youth and
- 15 Families, Children's Bureau's Child Maltreatment Survey in 2016 substantiated, or
- 16 found strong evidence to indicate that, 57,329 children were victims of sexual abuse;
- 17 and
- 18 WHEREAS, The Lifetime Prevalence of Child Sexual Abuse and Sexual Assault
- 19 Assessed in Late Adolescence Health Journal mentions that 1 in 9 girls and 1 in 20
- 20 boys under the age of 18 experience sexual abuse or assault; and
- 21 WHEREAS, The Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of
- 22 Justice Statistics, Sexual Assault of Young Children as Reported to Law Enforcement

1	(2000) reported 82% of all juvenile victims are female and 90% of adult rape victims are
2	female; and
3	WHEREAS, According to Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs,
4	Bureau of Justice Statistics, Sex Offenses and Offenders females ages 16-19 are 4
5	times more likely than the general population to be victims of rape, attempted rape, or
6	sexual assault; and
7	WHEREAS, The Department of Health and Human Services' 2023 Child
8	Maltreatment Report substantiated 60,273 cases of sexual abuse of children under 18
9	years of age; and
10	WHEREAS, abuse occurs in all types of organized youth sports which
11	Childhelp.org research suggests sexual abuse in sports impacts between 2-8% of all
12	athletes, including youth athletes; and
13	WHEREAS, In the United States, the lifetime prevalence of sexual assault
14	among gender minorities is estimated at 47%, prior research with small samples of
15	gender minority youth has found sexual assault rates of over 50% in some
16	subpopulations, including transgender girls of color, transgender boys, and non-binary
17	youth assigned a female sex at birth; and
18	WHEREAS, The alarming frequency of sexual assaults, with someone being
19	sexually assaulted every 68 seconds according to the Rape, Abuse & Incest National
20	Network (RAINN), underscores the pressing need for sustained efforts in prevention,
21	intervention, and support services for survivors; and
22	WHEREAS, Sexual assault disproportionately affects certain populations, such
23	as Native Americans and Alaska Natives, who experience significantly higher rates of

1 victimization, underscoring the need for culturally sensitive and inclusive support services; and 2 WHEREAS. The effects of child sexual abuse can be long-lasting and victims 3 are4 times more likely to develop symptoms of drug abuse, 4 times more likely to 4 5 experience PTSD as adults, and 3 times more likely to experience a major depressive 6 episode as adults; and 7 WHEREAS, Collaborations among various agencies and professionals, including law enforcement, healthcare providers, educators, and victim support services, are 8 9 crucial in addressing and combating sexual violence; and 10 WHEREAS, The San Francisco Youth Commission will work with organizations 11 that tackle and address sexual assault to bring awareness, prevention efforts, and deter 12 sexual violence in all communities; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission recognizes April 2025 13 14 as National Sexual Assault Awareness and Prevention Month; and 15 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission introduce and urge the Mayor, Board of Supervisors, and other elected officials representing San 16 17 Francisco to recognize the month of April as National Sexual Assault Awareness and 18 Prevention Month to educate the impacts of sexual assault amongst young people in 19 the City and County of San Francisco; and therefore be it 20 FURTHER RESOLVED, That San Francisco Youth Commission staff are directed to transmit copies of this resolution to the Office of the Mayor, Board of 21 22 Supervisors, and other elected officials representing San Francisco.
