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| 3 | wrapping, take-out bags, and beverage containers in San Francisco |
| 4 | WHEREAS, According to the San Francisco Bay Keeper, since 2019, 7 trillion |
| 5 | pieces of plastic have flowed into the San Francisco Bay every year; and |
| 6 | WHEREAS, According to the EPA, over 26 million tons of petroleum-based |
| 7 | plastic end up in U.S. landfills alone each year; and |
| 8 | WHEREAS, The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration defines |
| 9 | microplastics as scraps of plastic less than five millimeters in length; and |
| 10 | WHEREAS, Plastic that flows into the San Francisco Bay detrimentally harms |
| 11 | marine life in their consumption of microplastics, and ultimately, humans. This leads to |
| 12 | many harmful health conditions, such as various illnesses, like lung cancer, respiratory |
| 13 | issues (asthma), and inflammatory diseases; and |
| 14 | WHEREAS, In an article published in 2025, the University of Mexico researchers |
| 15 | found alarmingly high levels of microplastics in human brains, noting that the amount |
| 16 | has doubled in the past eight years; and |
| 17 | WHEREAS, A study by "Nature" (website) found that human brains contained |
| 18 | plastics from eating out of plastic silverware and drinking out of plastic bottles. |
| 19 | Additionally, it was found that plastics were consumed by immune cells, which end up |
| 20 | amassing and blocking small blood vessels in the brain; and |
| 21 | WHEREAS, Ocean conservancy is a vital component to sustaining San |
| 22 | Francisco's food supply, regulating the health of ecosystems, and stabilizing |
| 23 | atmospheric temperatures; and |

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[Eliminating Single-Use Plastic]

| 1 | WHEREAS, In 2019, San Francisco passed The Single-Use Foodware Plastics, |
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| 2 | Toxics, and Litter Reduction Ordinance, "aimed towards reducing plastic pollution, |
| 3 | reducing toxic chemicals in foodware, and protecting public health" which banned all |
| 4 | single-use plastic items and mandated all single-use foodware to be compostable with |
| 5 | no perfluoroalkoxy (PFAS), and stated that customer dine-in, take-out, or delivery meals |
| 6 | must not include single-use plastic food and beverage accessories, and that 10% of all |
| 7 | beverages must be served in reusable containers for all San Francisco events serving |
| 8 | more than 100 attendees; and |
| 9 | WHEREAS, Senate Bill 54 (SB 54), mandates "all single-use packaging and |
| 10 | plastic foodware service like cutlery, takeout containers, plates and cups in California be |
| 11 | recyclable or compostable by 2032, with a 25% reduction in single-use plastic |
| 12 | packaging and food service ware and a 65% recycling rate for these materials"; and |
| 13 | WHEREAS, Eliminating plastic packaging in San Francisco aligns with the city's |
| 14 | 2025 Climate Action Plan goals, committing to expanding reuse and refill services |
| 15 | across the city to meet California's goals to produce 25% less new single-use plastics |
| 16 | and overall reduce total waste generation by 15% by 2030; and |
| 17 | WHEREAS, Eliminating plastic packaging in San Francisco aligns with both the |
| 18 | City and state plastic reduction goals; and |
| 19 | WHEREAS, Eliminating plastic packaging would significantly reduce landfill |
| 20 | waste and ocean pollution while lowering carbon emissions and promoting compostable |
| 21 | or reusable alternatives; and |

| 1 | WHEREAS, Eliminating plastic packaging in San Francisco would also propel the |
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| 2 | City to move towards a circular economy – a shared vision in California and throughout |
| 3 | the United States; and |
| 4 | WHEREAS, In May of 2022, following several months of countywide outreach, |
| 5 | the City of San Rafael adopted the County of Marin's Reusable Foodware Model |
| 6 | Ordinance. Adoption of this ordinance is aimed at reducing the amount of single-use |
| 7 | plastics in our waste streams and our storm drains, creeks, and Bay; and |
| 8 | RESOLVED, The Youth Commission urges the Mayor and Board of Supervisors |
| 9 | to eliminate all plastic packaging for the City of San Francisco to protect youth and |
| 10 | families from the health consequences of microplastics in food consumption, etc., and |
| 11 | be it |
| 12 | FURTHER RESOLVED, The Youth Commission emphasizes the importance of |
| 13 | ocean conservation's impact on the climate and urges the Mayor and Board of |
| 14 | Supervisors to protect the planet the youth will inherit; and be it |
| 15 | FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Mayor and Board of Supervisors adopt these |
| 16 | recommendations, commit to establishing new goals to effectively eliminate plastic |
| 17 | packaging in San Francisco with input from community based organizations, San |
| 18 | Francisco Environment, and San Francisco Environmental Commission to understand |
| 19 | the pressing urgency that single-use plastics has for youth across San Francisco, and |
| 20 | provide it with the appropriate funding and allocation of the budget; and be it |
| 21 | FURTHER RESOLVED, That San Francisco Youth Commission staff are |
| 22 | directed to transmit copies of this resolution to the Office of the Mayor, Board of |
| 23 | Supervisors, and other elected officials representing San Francisco. |
