2 Resolution in support of expanding family shelter options.

3	WHEREAS, Current policy with the Department of Homelessness and Supportive
4	Housing limits families to a maximum of 90 days in shelters instead of indefinitely; and
5	WHEREAS, If a family needs additional time, the shelter can authorize three 30-
6	day extensions based on family circumstances; and
7	WHEREAS, According to the 2023 SFUSD Students and Families Experiencing
8	Homelessness (SAFEH) report, 2403 students are experiencing homelessness; and
9	WHEREAS, According to the San Francisco 2024 point in time count, there are
10	currently 405 families experiencing homelessness; and
11	WHEREAS, At least 40 families were at serious risk of eviction due to the 90-day
12	shelter limit before being granted a 30-day extension in late January; and
13	WHEREAS, According to the Department of Homelessness and Supportive
14	Housing (HSH) data, 83% of families in shelters are families with children; and
15	WHEREAS, Many of those families are monolingual and/or immigrants; and
16	WHEREAS, Immigrant families in shelters have received eviction notices despite
17	working towards housing stability, including having a case manager and applying for
18	rental subsidies; and
19	WHEREAS, Immigrant families in shelters face additional challenges of language
20	barriers, employment opportunity, and the fear of being deported; and
21	WHEREAS, Youth facing homelessness on the streets face an increased risk for
22	mental illness, physical health issues, substance abuse, physical and sexual assault;

1	WHEREAS, Families and youth experiencing homelessness deserve our support
2	in preventing them from being sent back to sleep on the streets; and
3	WHEREAS, Evicting families and youth from shelters without the ability to access
4	permanent housing causes further financial instability and fails to provide humane
5	solutions to homelessness; and
6	WHEREAS, Access to homeless shelter services is a critical resource for families
7	experiencing homelessness, providing temporary stability to help pathway to permanent
8	housing; and
9	WHEREAS, In light of anti-immigrant policies and threats coming from the
10	Federal level, it is especially important that San Francisco continue to uphold its values
11	of compassion by supporting immigrant families who need homeless shelter resources;
12	and, now, therefore be it
13	RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission urges the Board of
14	Supervisors and Mayor to eliminate city policy of evicting families from shelters to
15	protect immigrant families and youth from further instability; and be it
16	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission recognizes
17	that evicting families from shelters is not a sustainable, compassionate, or humane way
18	to address homelessness in the city; and be it
19	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission recognizes
20	the need for shelters to have culturally competent services especially given many
21	families in shelters are immigrants, including legal assistance; and be it

1	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission urges the
2	Mayor and Board of Supervisors to advocate for increased shelter capacity in all areas
3	of the city; and be it
4	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission urges the
5	Board of Supervisors and Mayor to focus on long term solutions of affordable housing,
6	workforce development programs, and mental health services instead of eviction
7	measures; and be it
8	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission recognizes
9	that addressing the above mentioned issues will help solve the root issues of
10	homelessness in the city; and be it
11	FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to Faith in
12	Action, Coalition on Homelessness, Supervisor Fielder, Supervisor Chan, Supervisor
13	Melgar, and HSH.
